

'Rights' Violated, Muslims Say

Malcolm X, a New York City representative of the Black Muslims sect, yesterday charged Rochester police violated "human rights" by allegedly breaking up a religious service of the sect Sunday night.

He lodged protests, but did not file formal complaints, with the State Commission for Human Rights and with Public Safety Commissioner Donald J. Corbett.

The complaint is over a clash between police and members of the sect at a meeting of the group at 304 North St. Two members of the sect were arraigned yesterday on charges of second degree assault and resisting arrest. They were released in \$500 bail each and their case was referred to the Grand Jury by City Court Judge Alphonse Cassetti.

Deputy Public Safety Commissioner Albert

O. Daniels said Malcolm X and Robert X, a Buffalo minister, had objected to the "interruption of a so-called religious service." Daniels said he told them there would be a "complete investigation of the whole thing."

Commissioner Lloyd L. Hurst of the State Commission for Human Rights said Malcolm X made a similar protest to his office, terming the incident "a violation of human rights." Hurst said Malcolm X contended that a similar situation would not have occurred "if some one called and said there was somebody in another church with a gun."

Meanwhile, Executive Deputy Police Chief Henry H. Jensen said a "routine watch" had been placed over the homes of Patrolmen Anthony D'Angelo and John Hunt who said they were injured in the clash with the Muslims.

Jensen said no men were stationed outside the patrolmen's homes, but that police in the area had been alerted that "something could happen." He added that "we do not anticipate any trouble."

The alert was set up after Hunt received an anonymous telephone call yesterday, telling him to get his wife and children out of the house." Hunt moved his family.

Goldstein Small, 34, of 80 Atlantic Ave., and Donell Oliver, 23, of 81 Portland Ave., were the two men arrested Sunday after Hunt and D'Angelo identified them as the men who assaulted them. Police said about 20 men attended the meeting, but Oliver and Small were the only ones the two patrolmen recognized.

D'Angelo and Hunt were treated at Genesee Hospital and released after examination.
