| 3 | | The area is a, it's a known hot spot for, for |
| 4 | | violence, for vice activity, drug sales; you |
| 5 | | name it. And we saw a group, a large group. |
| 6 | | There was probably ten plus people out there. |
| 7 | | They were shooting dice, playing chess, |
| 8 | | drinking. That whole thing. |
| 9 | | And for, you know, for public offense. We, |
| 10 | | we mainly just were going to disperse the group |
| 11 | | from participating in the vice activity. |
| 12 | Q. | Okay. And what happened next? |
| 13 | A. | Um, most of the group started walking slowly |
| 14 | | away, except for Mr. Benny Warr, who was seated |
| 15 | | in the wheelchair at the corner there. I |
| 16 | | believe his words were, when I told him, gave |
| 17 | | him the lawful order to disperse, he told me, |
| 18 | 14 | fuck you, mother fucker. |
| 19 | Q. | What did you specifically tell him to do? |
| 20 | Α. | I just told him, you know, to disperse the area. |

Um, actually, I'm going to elaborate on that a A. 1 little more. 2 As we walked across the street, a couple of 3 the guys that were hanging out before were like, 4 you know, I overheard them saying, you can't 5 talk to him like that. And he needs to go to 6 jail. And stuff like that. 7 So I mean, I knew that at that point, this 8 created quite a stir out there. Um, you know, 9 he got the attention that he wanted. 10 And we, as we were approaching him at the 11 bus stop, he was with a couple of females, I 12 believe. I'm not really sure who else was 13 around, but you know, he was still carrying on. 14 Fuck them cops, you know, they can suck my dick. 15 And as he's screaming this, not only did the 16 group that we already dispersed kind of stick 17 around and come back, but we actually had more 18 people coming from Bartlett Street and coming 19 out of the, like the store area of 595 20 Jefferson. 21 You know, more and more people started 22 coming out and gathering around, you know, 23 because of, of just his yelling, screaming, and 24 just his blatant disrespect for, for, you know, 25

put your hands behind your back. You're going 1 to jail. He wouldn't do it. He refused. 2 So when I went to go take him by his wrist 3 to try and get his hand behind his back, I couldn't even grab his wrist, because he 5 immediately threw a punch and punched me in the genitals. And it kind of threw me off guard. 7 So at that point, you know, I knew that verbal tactics weren't going to work with this 9 guy, and he's already trying to fight with us. 10 So I deployed a one-second burst of pepper spray 11 to try and see if that would change his channel 12 a little bit. It didn't. 13 So, again, after the pepper spray, I went to 14 try and grab him by his arm, but he was swinging 15 his fist, I couldn't, there was no way I could 16 grab and control his arm. 17 Um, you know, at that point we knew we had 18 to try a different tactic. We weren't going to 19 handcuff him while he was in the chair. 20 The size of him, he's a big guy. He's 21 probably close to 300 pounds, and strong upper 22 body. There was no way we were going to control 23 his wrists while he was seated in that chair. 24 So, you know, we had to change our tactics 25

up a little bit, maybe try to get him on the ground, so maybe we can go from there and attempt to take him into custody.

- Q. Okay. So then what happened?
- Om, while he was on the ground, he -- you know, once we got him on the ground, things got a little bit, a little bit more stressful. More people started coming out. More people started yelling, threatening us, swearing, screaming.

He continued to fight. He was throwing his fists around, trying to hit us; trying to strike us. I was still a little thrown off because of, you know, the spot where he hit me.

So, you know, while he was trying to strike us, you know, I threw maybe two or three knee strikes into his stomach to try and get his fists under control, his wrist under control to try and maybe place him in handcuffs.

I monitored in between each knee strike, he was still, you know, actively fighting. We were getting, we were getting tired out at that point. We had to divide our attention between, you know, Benny Warr, who's fighting and you know, a large angry group now that has, has, you know, surrounded us.

there. You know, 20, 30 people. 1 And then across the street where we dealt 2 with Mr. Warr, you know, there was ten plus 3 people out there. There was large groups out 4 there, shooting dice, playing chess. Basically, 5 drinking. So there was a lot of people out 6 there. 7 You mentioned that Mr. Warr was with a few 8 Q. people. What were your general observations in 9 relation to Mr. Warr or who he was with, or what 10 he was doing? 11 Mr. Warr was just, I mean, he was pretty much 12 A. just sitting on the corner there with a bunch of 13 other groups, a bunch of other males. And he 14 was yelling into traffic. He was participating 15 in, you know, the vice activity down there with 16 those guys. 17 He served no purpose to just be seated there 18 on the sidewalk, other than being, probably be a 19 nuisance. 20 Now, you said that you had previous knowledge of 0. 21 Mr. Warr's associations with other criminals or 22 involved in vice activity. 23 Have you had previous interactions with him? 24 Um, I never arrested him before, but I have had 25

able body guy and he was behaving like that, and 1 all of a sudden we told him he was under arrest 2 and he started to run, I mean, then we would 3 have a foot pursuit on hand, and like a three 4 ring circus down there. 5 But because he was in a wheelchair, he moved 6 over.
